Kathy Crisson Completes Lay Director Assignment

Charlotte Lay Director, Kathy Crisson steps down to make way for newly appointed John Sequeira (more about him on the back of the Newsletter). Kathy agreed to provide some of her background, since she took on the assignment.

I am a small-town girl, born in Midwestern Olney, Illinois. My family soon moved to southern Indiana, and then to High Point, North Carolina while I was in the third grade. I grew up as a cradle Catholic along with three brothers and two sisters. We are a close-knit family, which my mother and father bolstered throughout the years with an annual week-long trip to the beach (now about 55 years) that included numerous relatives. This has given me a real appreciation for large families.

I have been married for almost 47 years to Jim, who is a cerebral type of guy (you know, one of those psychology professors), and can make me laugh. Those were two qualities I was looking for in an "eligible" spouse. Jim is currently enjoying his retirement. So, we will touch on the Movement focus these past 3 years. The Charlotte Diocese Cursillo Newsletter was reinstated as was the Grand Ultreya. By-Laws were updated, and the Secretariat took on the task of updating/creating position descriptions for all its members. A Tracking Report lists all ongoing activities with accountability from Secretariat members. Sponsorship Guidelines were updated and reviewed, Candidate Application and other forms were revised, a Trifold Brochure was developed, and the Diocesan Cursillo Website has been expanded. We have a new Ultreya in Gastonia. We began a new event, the Weekend Reunion, to include men and women from the Weekends and help them in their 4th day. The School of Leaders is developing Breakout Sessions to help the work of the Movement: the Weekend Kitchen, the Rector Manuals, Growing Cursillo (to include group presentations), Eucharistic Congress representation, Grand Ultreya, and more. All of this increased energy and excitement has led to significant growth in our School of Leaders. Kathy continues to be involved, and is confident that the Holy Spirit is leading the Movement through the Secretariat, the School of Leaders, and the Cursillo community.

We often get asked, "What is Ultreya and what is its purpose?" In official terms, this is what we should be saying:

Ultreya is a gathering of local Group Reunions that share their Christian commitments, growth, and apostolic work. It is also a place for new Cursillistas to gather, and to aid those not in a Group Reunion find one that is suitable for them.

The purpose of Ultreya is to encourage living the Faith, supporting other Cursillistas in their apostolic action through personal testimonies. It is a way for Christian friends who wish to keep alive the fundamental Christianity they experienced on the Weekend, and a means of unifying the Cursillistas into a movement.

Now, there is nothing wrong with this explanation; however, here in Greensboro, this is what it means to us:

Ultreya is a time for fellowship with our fellow Cursillista brothers and sisters in Christ. It is a time to catch up with friends, once a month, sharing a meal and conversation. It is a time to share our faith experiences with both men and women, outside of our Small Group Reunions. It is a time to listen as our fellow Cursillistas share their personal witness.

The Greensboro Ultreya meets on the second Sunday of every month, from 6:15 pm – 8:30 pm, in the Parish Life Center at St. Paul the Apostle in Greensboro. Cursillistas in the Greensboro area can come from a variety of churches: St. Paul the Apostle, St. Pius X, Our Lady of Grace, Immaculate Heart of Mary, St. Mary's, St. Benedict's, Holy Cross, Our Lady of the Highways, Holy Infants, and St. Peter Yu.

We are blessed to have Deacon Mike Martini or Deacon Francis Skinner join us when their schedules allow. On many occasions, we are privileged to have both in attendance to gather us in prayer over the meal that we share before Ultreya begins. This is a great time for old friends to get together in fellowship, but for new friends as well.

We begin Ultreya by introducing ourselves by name, parish, weekend lived and table saint, often bringing lots of laughter when years and table saints are long forgotten! This is followed by our Ultreya Small Group Sharing and a lively rendition of DeColores if our resident musician, Christy Holmes, is in attendance.

Our witness talks bring it all together; the stories, the joys, the heartaches, the journeys – everyone has something to share. And the echoes and reflections of our spiritual advisors are heartfelt, thought-provoking, and often inspiring. Our time together is then closed with any announcements and prayer intentions.
